From May 3 to August 27, 2018, the exhibition The Eroticism of Things. Collections on the History of Sexuality is on display at the Werkbundarchiv - Museum der Dinge, Berlin. The exhibition, co-curated by CARMAH researcher Hannes Hacke, traces the material and immaterial production of eroticism. Using examples culled from the collections of sexologists Magnus Hirschfeld and Alfred C. Kinsey and art collector Naomi Wilzig, the exhibition sheds light on differing natures of and intents in collecting, classifying, presenting, and interpreting erotic things.
