TRACES Final Conference and Exhibition, Milan

TRACES – Transmitting Contentious Cultural Heritages with the Arts: From Intervention to Co-Production will conclude its three-year research programme with a two-day event (Jan 17-18, 2018, Milan), merging a critical overview on the main findings ensuing from its investigations and a forward-looking discussion about the future of contentious heritages' transmission in Europe and the concept of Reflexive Europeanisation. A highly interdisciplinary panel of scholars and practitioners from all over the world will trigger a multiperspective debate. The symposium will culminate in the opening of the TRACES final exhibition, 'Contentious Objects/Ashamed Subjects', curated by Suzana Milevska at the Politecnico di Milano.

Exhibition 'Heritage Futures. How can we create the future together?', Manchester

Combining latest academic research with incredible objects, the exhibition (from Dec 14, 2018, Manchester Museum) looks at heritage as the building blocks of the future, through four themes: Profusion explores what we should we pass on to future generations in an age of mass production and consumption. Diversity reflects on how diversity in nature and in cultural traditions can help people and nature cope with



future uncertainty. Transformation looks at heritage as something that is not fixed, but that changes over time. Uncertainty considers what should we pass on to future generations, when we can't be sure what they will want or need. More info on the exhibition here.
