Katarzyna Puzon was invited to give a lecture at the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Religious and Ethnic Diversity in Göttingen. Her talk 'Germans without Footnotes: Islam, Belonging and Poetry Slam in Berlin' was concerned with the ways in which young Muslims of the i,Slam collective combine oral traditions of 'Islamic heritage' with a contemporary format of poetry performance and negotiate their belonging through the medium of poetry slam in the current German context.
