# Symposium 'Otherwise - Rethinking Museums and Heritage' at CARMAH (26-28 July 2017)

How can we think and do museums and heritage differently? Where is the productive conceptual energy to do so? This symposium brought together international scholars and practitioners to think creatively, critically, and anthropologically about some of the liveliest concepts and practices circulating in museums and heritage today. The themes of provenance, translocality, alterity, post-ethnological and engagement were explored through panel sessions, heritage walks through Berlin and through a young researcher-led World Café.

## TRACES Midterm Meeting in Berlin (25-29 September 2017)

The **TRACES** Midterm meeting brought together all eleven TRACES partners to discuss and analyse current issues and challenges that each Creative Co-production (CCP) and work package

is facing, as well as to debate the concepts of 'Contentious Heritage' and 'Reflexive Europeanisation'. Following three days of internal workshops, a public conference titled 'Critical Heritages and Reflexive Europeanisation' was held at the Berlin Wall Memorial, in collaboration with the EU-Horizon2020 project CoHERE.

#### **Exhibition by Tal Adler at the Welt Museum Wien**

TRACES researcher and artist **Tal Adler** opened his temporary and well-received exhibition "Sharing Stories. Speaking Objects" at the newly re-opened Welt Museum Wien on 25 October 2017. The exhibition features highlights object stories - portrayed in Tal Adler's photographic object-portraits in their 'usual place' as well as video interviews with the owners of these objects and with other people talking about these objects from their own perspective.



#### Jewish Museum Expert Workshop at CARMAH (2-3 November 2017)

Organized by Hetty Berg from the Jewish Historical Museum Amsterdam, CARMAH was thrilled to host museum curators and experts from several international Jewish museums. The two-day discussions focussed on exploring current developments and strategies for permanent exhibitions in European Jewish museums.

#### **New CARMAH Researchers**

It is now two years since CARMAH was founded, though all of our staff have been in post for less time than that, several for less than a year. Our newest recruit is **Tahani Nadim**, who in October 2017 has taken up a special Junior Professorship funded by the Berlin Museum of Natural History. Tahani brings a longstanding cultural interest, shaped especially by science studies, in museums of natural history, including in questions of

knowledge production and diversity.

Last semester also saw the appointment of another Junior Professor, Christoph

Bareither, whose research area is media with an emphasis on ethnographic approaches to media use – an area that really deserves developing in museum and heritage studies.

Tahani and Christoph will also each work with Alexander von Humboldt PhD students who have been appointed to our project Making Differences in Berlin: Transforming Museums and Heritage in the 21st Century. Chiara Garbelotto will work with Tahani on our Science and Citizenship theme, undertaking innovative research on diversity and participation in the MfN. Nazlı Cabadağ works with Christoph on the Media and Mediation theme, investigating media-use in relation to Berlin's Turkish LGBTQI community.


### New Cooperation between the Centre Maurice Halbwachs, CARMAH and the Haus der Kulturen der Welt

CARMAH will expand its European network by cooperating with the research group around the seminar and doctoral atelier "Rewriting the Colonial Past: Contemporary Challenges of Museum Collections", organized since 2016 by Felicity Bodenstein, Benoît de L'Estoile, Damiana Otoiu, Margareta von Oswald, Dominique Poulot, Laurella Rincon and Anna Seiderer, and hosted by the Centre Maurice Halbwachs in Paris. From Spring 2018, workshops at CARMAH and at the Haus der Kulturen der Welt will be organized on questions of colonial legacies in the present, focusing on comparisons between France and Germany.
